ASSUMING VS KNOWING

The Sunshine Bridge in Donaldsonville will remain closed for months rather than days due to damage caused by a recent barge accident. The bridge, which crosses the Mississippi River, was closed indefinitely Friday, October 12th after a barge carrying a crane collided with the southwest portion of the bridge. For the 25,000-plus people who travel across the bridge daily, that means they now have to take an alternate route to cross the Mississippi River in either Baton Rouge or Gramercy.

With the facts of this accident still unknown, it leads many to question how could this have happened. It appears as the vessel was preparing to make this maneuver, the crew believed they would clear the bridge. Do you think their crew might have made an assumption on bridge clearance, crane height, or the river stage? Our recent incidents show that we are still making decisions based on assumptions rather than knowing the facts. If your crew has not done so already, in your next safety meeting discuss ways in which this incident could have been avoided.

TANKERMAN SCHOOL

In November 2017, Cenac Marine Services dedicated a fully refurbished barge to South Louisiana Community College's maritime program. That barge is now being used at SLCC, training the next generation of mariners including 3 of our very own. Ramp Up Operations with Attention to Details

A towboat operation can be described as a system of many parts and procedures controlled by the people on-board. There is very little on a boat or barge that does not have some sort of function to help make the system work. Our procedures are based on regulations and best practices with the goal of a safe and productive workplace.

In all, there is a lot that needs attention, detail, and precision. Taking shortcuts or deviating from procedures can have significant impacts. There is a saying, "the Devil is in the details," which expresses the idea that whatever one does, it should be done thoroughly.

Why? Because details are important!

NEAR MISSES

Why report near misses?

Near misses are unplanned events that had the potential to result in injury, illness, or damage.

- -Although an injury may not be sustained, reporting near misses provide the opportunity to prevent future incidents.
- -A near miss is very close to an incident that causes harm, therefore investigating the root cause(s) of a near miss can prevent a similar incident in the future that results in serious injury or damage.

Near misses are a warnings!

Letting a near miss go unreported provides an opportunity for a serious accident to occur. Correcting theses actions or conditions will enhance safety and provide a better working environment for everyone. Don't let yourself or co-workers become statistics - report near misses immediately!

We track, trend, and share near miss data for a reason, to raise fleet awareness. Your near miss report one week could prevent an incident on another vessel the next week!
